THE GOSPEL Matthew 1:18-25

Reader The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

"Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel,"

which means, "God is with us." When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife, but had no marital relations with her until she had borne a son; and he named him Jesus.

THE SERMON The Rev. Paul Frolick

THE NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Please stand or kneel. THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

As we joyfully await the coming of Christ and prepare to receive the sign of God's promise made flesh, let us pray for the needs of the church, our community, and the world. A brief silence Gracious God, be with us as we prepare our hearts, our souls, and our minds for the birth of your son. Make our homes havens of blessing and peace for family and friends; and may those of us who live alone enjoy our solitude and find fulfillment in loving you and our neighbors.

People God of love, hear our prayer.

Faithful God, you called your servant Joseph to trust your promise and to act with courage, even when the path ahead was unclear. Give us grace to discern your call and to listen for your voice in the quiet places of our lives. When answers are not easy and the way forward is uncertain, help us to walk by faith and not by fear, preparing our hearts to receive the new life you are bringing into the world. God of love, hear our prayer.

Reconciling God, you long to restore your people and to shine your light upon the nations. Lead the world from fear to trust, from division to truth, and from violence to peace. Heal what has been broken by injustice and cruelty. We pray especially for the people of Ukraine, Gaza, Sudan, and all places torn apart by conflict, displacement, and grief. God of love, hear our prayer.

Guiding God, we pray for those who are traveling this week. Protect them from every danger and bring them in safety to their journey's end. We pray for those who will spend this Christmas away from family and friends, including the men and women in the Armed Forces, and all whose duty or circumstance keeps them from those they love. God of love, hear our prayer.

Compassionate God, we pray for those who suffer from any grief or trouble. We pray for those who are hungry, cold, and without a home. We pray for those who are out of work. We pray for families that experience stress over the holidays, for those who will spend this first Christmas without a loved one, and for all who find the holidays painful. We remember especially those on our prayer list, and those whose needs are known to you alone. Pause Restore them to wholeness and health in your good time and in your good way. **God of** love, hear our prayer.

Eternal God, we commend to your care all who have died, remembering especially Samuel Warren, in whose memory the greens are given today, and all those we love but see no longer. *Silence* Grant to the departed eternal rest. **Let light perpetual shine upon them.**

Ever-present God, from ages past you promised salvation, and in the fullness of time you came among us as Emmanuel, God-with-us. Strengthen us, like Joseph, to trust your presence and to act with faithful courage. Receive the prayers we offer this day, and shape our lives by your nearness and mercy; through the power of your Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**



It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth. Because you sent your beloved Son to redeem us from sin and death, and to make us heirs in him of everlasting life; that when he shall come again in power and great triumph to judge the world, we may without shame or fear rejoice to behold his appearing.

Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

SANCTUS

Holy, holy, holy Lord

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." Therefore, according to his command, O Father,"

We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory;

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. Amen.

As our Savior Christ has taught us, we now pray,

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your Name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial, and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and for ever. Amen.

Please come forward and stand or kneel at the rail. The priest will place the bread in your outstretched palm (Consecrated rice wafers are available for those with wheat allergies - simply ask the priest). You may dip (intinct) the bread in the wine in the small cup held by the first Eucharistic minister, or drink from the large chalice held by the second Eucharistic minister.

Please know that Christ is fully present in both the bread and the wine - there is no requirement to receive both. If you do not wish to receive communion, you may come forward, cross your hands over your chest, and receive a blessing.

LEVAS 14: Soon and Very Soon

The fourth week of Advent brings us right to the brink of Christmas, so we move from the warnings of earlier lessons and the tension of waiting. Now we can rejoice and hope at the fulfillment of all good things in the Incarnation and the Second Coming; this hymn is one of the happiest expressions of that great hope. Written by the popular and influential Gospel songwriter and minister, André Crouch (1942-2015), this exuberant song has been widely published and translated since it was written in 1976. -- Donna Wessel Walker

Margaret Burke (b. 1990) is Director of Choral Activities at Carthage College in Kenosha, Wisconsin. She earned her Doctor of Musical Arts degree in choral conducting at the University of Michigan, where she studied with Eugene Rogers and, in addition to directing the University Choir, was Assistant Conductor of the Men's and Women's Glee Clubs. She also is a recipient of the Robert Shaw Prize awarded by the Institute of Sacred Music at Yale University for outstanding achievement in choral conducting. -- Dennis Powers
