THE SECOND LESSON Philemon 1-21

Paul, a prisoner of Christ Jesus, and Timothy our brother,

To Philemon our dear friend and co-worker, to Apphia our sister, to Archippus our fellow soldier, and to the church in your house:

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

When I remember you in my prayers, I always thank my God because I hear of your love for all the saints and your faith toward the Lord Jesus. I pray that the sharing of your faith may become effective when you perceive all the good that we may do for Christ. I have indeed received much joy and encouragement from your love, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you, my brother.

For this reason, though I am bold enough in Christ to command you to do your duty, yet I would rather appeal to you on the basis of love-- and I, Paul, do this as an old man, and now also as a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for my child, Onesimus, whose father I have become during my imprisonment. Formerly he was useless to you, but now he is indeed useful both to you and to me.

I am sending him, that is, my own heart, back to you. I wanted to keep him with me, so that he might be of service to me in your place during my imprisonment for the gospel; but I preferred to do nothing without your consent, in order that your good deed might be voluntary and not something forced. Perhaps this is the reason he was separated from you for a while, so that you might have him back forever, no longer as a slave but more than a slave, a beloved brother--especially to me but how much more to you, both in the flesh and in the Lord.

So if you consider me your partner, welcome him as you would welcome me. If he has wronged you in any way, or owes you anything, charge that to my account. I, Paul, am writing this with my own hand: I will repay it. I say nothing about your owing me even your own self. Yes, brother, let me have this benefit from you in the Lord! Refresh my heart in Christ. Confident of your obedience, I am writing to you, knowing that you will do even more than I say.

THE SERMON The Rev. Paul Frolick

THE NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Confident in God's mercy, let us offer our prayers for the Church, the world, and all creation. *A brief silence* Make us mindful of all the blessings of this life: for the splendor of the whole creation, for the wonder of life, for the mystery of love, for family and friends, and for the loving care that surrounds us on every side.

People God of love, hear our prayer.

Grant that your Church may choose life by loving you and walking in your ways. Give us courage to take up the cross, to live with costly discipleship, and to bear witness in a world in need of reconciliation and hope. **God of love, hear our prayer.**

Guide the nations to turn from violence and destruction toward peace and cooperation. We remember especially places of war, unrest, and division: Ukraine, Gaza, Sudan, and all communities fractured by hatred or oppression. Grant humility and wisdom to the world's leaders, that they may seek justice and reconciliation. **God of love, hear our prayer.**

Make us faithful stewards of the earth, that we may choose life not only for ourselves but for generations to come. We pray for those already suffering from the effects of climate change—wildfires, floods, storms, and drought. Deepen our resolve to act with justice for the poor and care for your creation. **God of love, hear our prayer.**

Root us beside the living water of your Word, that our neighborhoods may flourish with justice, compassion, and peace. We pray for students, teachers, and families in this new school year; strengthen them with wisdom, patience, and joy. **God of love, hear our prayer.**

Comfort the sick, the poor, the imprisoned, the refugees, and all who feel abandoned. We remember especially those on our prayer list, those whose suffering is known to you alone, and those we name in our hearts. *Pause* May they know your healing and sustaining love. **God of love, hear our prayer.**

Guide and protect all those who are dear to each of us. *Silence* Bless all whose lives are closely linked with ours, and grant that we may serve Christ in them and love one another as he loves us. **God of love, hear our prayer.**

Shelter in your eternal light those who have carried the cross before us, whose lives bore witness to your love. We remember especially Janet F. White, Robert Schwandt, Stanley D. Bielby, and Ross Margeson, in whose memory the flowers are given this week. *Silence* May they rest in peace and rise in glory. **God of love, hear our prayer.**

God of mercy and justice, you set before us the choice of life and death: strengthen us to choose life by loving you, walking in your ways, and bearing Christ's cross. Hear our prayers this day, and make us instruments of your peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**





Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.



Please come forward and stand or kneel at the rail. The priest will place the bread in your outstretched palm (Consecrated rice wafers are available for those with wheat allergies - simply as the priest). You may dip (intinct) the bread in the wine in the small cup held by the first Eucharistic minister, or drink from the large chalice held by the second Eucharistic minister.

Please know that Christ is fully present in both the bread and the wine - there is no requirement to receive both. If you do not with to receive communion, you may come forward, cross your hands over your chest, and receive a blessing.

Hymn 675: Take up your Cross

This text explores the implications of Jesus' statement in today's gospel that his true followers must take up their cross and follow him. Each verse explores one challenge we face when taking up the cross: its weighty demands, its shame, its danger, and the need to remain faithful to death. This cross is not the suffering of daily life we sometimes mean when we speak of putting up with something as "bearing my cross." Rather, the cross of Christ severs us violently from our old life: bringing death, it offers hope only as we follow Christ into new life. -- Donna Wessel Walker
