
Fund Drive for Food Gatherers

THE FIRST LESSON Exodus 32:7-14

The LORD said to Moses, "Go down at once! Your people, whom you brought up out of the land of Egypt, have acted perversely; they have been quick to turn aside from the way that I commanded them; they have cast for themselves an image of a calf, and have worshiped it and sacrificed to it, and said, 'These are your gods, O Israel, who brought you up out of the land of Egypt!'" THE SERMON The Rev. Paul Frolick

THE NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from

the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE Please stand or kneel.

Trusting in the God who seeks out the lost and delights in showing mercy, let us pray for the Church, the world, and all in need. *A brief silence* God of life, we give thanks for the gifts of creation, for the sun that lights our day and the moon and stars that shelter the night. May our eyes be open to the beauty around us. Help us to protect and nurture your creation and ever proclaim its wonders.

People Merciful God, hear our prayer.

God of grace, you search for the lost and rejoice when they are found: help us to be ever mindful of those who have been left behind, those who slip through the cracks of our social safety nets, and those who are easy for us to over look. **Merciful God, hear our prayer.**

God of peace, we pray for nations and leaders, that they may turn from pride and violence and seek reconciliation and peace. We remember especially places scarred by war, oppression, and injustice—Ukraine, Gaza, Sudan, and all who yearn for safety and freedom. **Merciful God, hear our prayer.**

God of mercy, who delights in reconciling what is broken, we pray for our country amid deep polarization and mistrust. Forgive us when we harden our hearts against one another. Seek us out when we are lost in anger, fear, or pride. Restore in us a spirit of humility, patience, and hope, that we may learn again to live as neighbors and work together for the common good. **Merciful God, hear our prayer.**

God of abundance, we give you thanks for Food Gatherers and for all who labor to provide nourishment for the hungry in Washtenaw County. Bless their ministry of gathering and giving, and bless our own Breakfast Program, which is strengthened by their generosity. Stir up in us thankful hearts and open hands, that as we receive your abundance we may also share it freely, so that none of our neighbors may go without daily bread. **Merciful God, hear our prayer.**

God of wholeness, we pray for all who are lost, alone, or afraid. Bring healing to the sick, hope to the despairing, and comfort to the grieving. We remember especially those on our prayer list and those whose needs are known to you alone. *Pause* Let your compassion be known through caregivers, advocates, and friends. **Merciful God, hear our prayer.**

God of resurrection, we remember before you all who have died, trusting in your mercy. We remember The Rev. Henry Lewis, in whose memory the flowers are given this morning, and all those dear to each of us. *Silence* May they rest in your peace and rise in your glory, as we await with them the joy of your kingdom. **Merciful God, hear our prayer.**

God of all, in Christ you search for the lost and rejoice when we are found. Hear the prayers we offer this day, forgive us our sins, and renew in us the joy of your salvation; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**





MUSIC NOTES -

Hymn 645: The King of Love my Shepherd is

One of our most beautiful hymns is this paraphrase of Psalm 23. In its words Sir Henry William Baker (1821-1877), a devoted High Church vicar in western England, captures God's joy in finding and retrieving us, which Jesus describes in today's gospel lesson. The word "rejoicing" in the third verse makes us pause to reflect that Jesus, our Good Shepherd, has sought us out and is glad to carry us home. Friends reported that this was the last thing Sir Henry said before he died. -- Donna Wessel Walker

The Lord Is My Shepherd (Rutter)

John Rutter (b. 1945) studied music at Clare College, Cambridge. He was Director of Music there from 1975 to 1979. In 1981, he founded the Cambridge Singers as a professional chamber choir primarily dedicated to recording. He is a Fellow of the Guild of Church Musicians, established by the Archbishop of Canterbury in 1888 to encourage high standards of church music, and an honorary Fellow of Westminster Choir College in Princeton, New Jersey. This morning's anthem, a setting of Psalm 23, was originally composed as a stand-alone work but later incorporated into his *Requiem* as Movement VI. -- *Dennis Powers*
