



THE GOSPEL

Luke 16:1-13

Reader People The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said to the disciples, "There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that this man was squandering his property. So he summoned him and said to him, `What is this that I hear about you? Give me an accounting of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer.' Then the manager said to himself, 'What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes.' So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' He answered, 'A hundred jugs of olive oil.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty.' Then he asked another, 'And how much do you owe?' He replied, 'A hundred containers of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill and make it eighty.' And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes.

"Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth."

THE SERMON

THE NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE Please stand or kneel.

In humility and trust, let us bring our prayers before God, who lifts up the poor and calls us to serve with faithfulness. *Silence* Make us mindful of all the blessings of this life: the splendor of the whole creation, the wonder of life, the mystery of love, the gift of family and friends, and the loving care that surrounds us on every side.

People God of love, hear our prayer.

Strengthen your Church to proclaim good news to the poor, freedom to the oppressed, and mercy to all. Guard us from compromise with greed or power, that we may be faithful stewards of your mysteries. **God of love, hear our prayer.**

Guide our leaders and all in authority, that they may govern with justice and compassion. Turn their hearts from corruption, exploitation, and violence. Support those working to end war in Ukraine, Gaza, Sudan, and all places torn by conflict. **God of love, hear our prayer.**

Inspire us to care for the earth in all its abundance. Forgive our wastefulness, and guide us in practices that protect the vulnerable from the impacts of climate change, floods, wildfires, and drought. May we live as faithful stewards of your creation. **God of love, hear our prayer.**

Sustain our neighborhoods, schools, and workplaces. Protect the vulnerable from hunger and want. We give thanks for ministries like Food Gatherers and our Breakfast Program, which share daily bread and dignity with neighbors in need. Inspire generosity and solidarity in our common life. **God of love, hear our prayer.**

Bless your servant The Rev. Charles Witke on his 94th birthday. Grant him joy, health, and peace. May his witness continue to inspire us to faithfulness, and may he know the deep love and gratitude of this community. **God of love, hear our prayer.**

Comfort all whose lives are shadowed by despair, isolation, or thoughts of self-harm. Surround them with your love and bring them into communities of care. Strengthen families, friends, and caregivers to offer listening ears and open hearts. Give us courage to bear one another's burdens, trusting in your promise that nothing can separate us from your love in Christ Jesus. **God of love, hear our prayer.**

Support all who are weighed down by illness, grief, or hardship. Lift up the poor, the hungry, the unemployed, and the exploited. We remember especially those on our prayer list, those whose needs are known to you alone, and those we name in our hearts. *Pause* May they know your comfort, healing, and hope. **God of love, hear our prayer.**

Embrace in your eternal love those who have gone before us in faith. We remember William S. Powers and Brian Campbell, in whose memory the flowers are given this week. *Silence* May they rest in peace and rise in glory. **God of love, hear our prayer.**

Continue to lift up the poor and humble the proud. Free us from our slavery to wealth and power, that we may serve you alone. Hear the prayers we offer this day, and make us faithful stewards of your grace; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**



Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith: **Christ has died.**

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **Amen.**


As our Savior Christ has taught us, we now pray,

Please come forward and stand or kneel at the rail. The priest will place the bread in your outstretched palm (Consecrated rice wafers are available for those with wheat allergies - simply ask the priest). You may dip (intinct) the bread in the wine in the small cup held by the first Eucharistic minister, or drink from the large chalice held by the second Eucharistic minister.

Please know that Christ is fully present in both the bread and the wine - there is no requirement to receive both. If you do not with to receive communion, you may come forward, cross your hands over your chest, and receive a blessing.

MUSIC NOTES -

Hymn 549: Jesus Calls Us

The Gospel lesson today describes Jesus calling disciples to follow him in strict and even severe terms, so we sing this strong discipleship hymn. The thoughtful text repays careful attention: rich in biblical references, it challenges us to follow Jesus in the context of our modern culture. David Hurd's thoughtful setting leads us into contemplation of Jesus' challenge. Mrs. Cecil Frances Alexander, who also wrote "All Things Bright and Beautiful," included this text in a collection called *Narrative Hymns for Children* in 1852. Not just for children: this is a text we all need to heed. -- *Donna Wessel Walker*

Missa Brevis: Agnus Dei (Dove)

The Cathedral Organists' Association commissioned Jonathan Dove (b. 1959) to compose his *Missa Brevis*, which was premiered at its annual conference in Wells Cathedral in 2009. The work is framed by the quietude of the Kyrie and Agnus Dei, which share a common drone feature of Fourth intervals in the organ pedal footwork. That pedal point underpins the quiet, introspective choral writing. At the conclusion of the Agnus Dei, which our choir sings this morning, those Fourth intervals resolve to the more familiar and consonant Fifth as the choral writing subsides into a mantra-like repetition of the words "dona nobis pacem."
