Dear friends,

Thank you for a good Annual Meeting last Sunday, January 26. It was great to see the Parish Hall full, and to sense such energy and engagement. If you weren't able to attend, the two questions we discussed at tables were, "What do you value most about St. Andrew's?" and "What are your dreams for our congregation?" I'd love to hear your responses and be able to share them (anonymously) with the Vestry as we chart a course for the next year and begin to make plans for our 200TH anniversary in 2027. Please send them to me at pfrolick@standrewsaa.org or drop them in the mail.

I suspect I disappointed some people this past week. Some of our members would have liked me to highlight Bishop Budde's sermon at the Service of Prayer for the Nation on January 21ST; others hoped I would offer a critique of its appropriateness, timing, and place. I'm also aware that we had a few visitors on Sunday, and we've had some inquiries during the week from people who are newly curious about the Episcopal church and what we stand for. I have reflected and prayed at length about how God may be calling us to lead in this season, and I keep coming back to our Baptismal Covenant, particularly these questions (found on page 304 of the *Book of Common Prayer*):

- Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of the bread, and in the prayers? I will, with God's help.
- Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord?
 I will, with God's help.
- Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ? I will, with God's help.
- Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself? I will, with God's help.


• Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being? I will, with God's help.

I said on Sunday that theologian Carol Lakey Hess says that whatever we take to be the heart of the gospel will be the central shaping force in our life of faith. The heart of the gospel has shifted for me over my life. As a kid, I think it was "Jesus loves me, this I know." As a teenager, I was drawn to "The saints of God are just folk like me, and I mean to be one, too." At other times, I held onto "I am the way, and the truth, and the life" as a sort of mantra. In this season, I am drawn to our Baptismal Covenant, and to the acknowledgement that I need God's help to fulling live into it.

I need your help, too. When I disappoint or upset you, as I inevitably will, please don't hesitate to reach out and let me know. I welcome conversation and the chance to learn about other perspectives, and I welcome the opportunity to more fully share mine. One of the things I love about the Episcopal church, and one of the reasons I was drawn to ordination, is that we try to be a big tent, welcoming all people, regardless of their background, gender, race, sexual orientation, or beliefs. Being a big tent can be hard work, especially if you're serious about welcoming people who don't believe the same things you do. I am committed to that work, and pray that you'll help me do it.

Grateful for all of you and for the gift of being part of this congregation.




What is king cake?

The version of king cakes we know today is an oval-shaped brioche cake, akin to the taste and texture of cinnamon rolls! They're decked out with green, gold, and purple sprinkles on top. A little gaudy for my taste. The first king cakes were made in Europe to celebrate Epiphany, and the French brought it over to Louisiana in the 1870s.

Today, king cake is synonymous with the celebration of Carnival season in New Orleans, leading up to Fat Tuesday, better known as Mardi Gras.

Outreach and Social Justice Ministry

On Sunday, January 19, 2025, in the lounge after the 10:00 am service, more than 25 people met to learn about the work that has been done at St. Andrew's in the area of Outreach and Social Justice and to talk about future work in this area. We acknowledged many projects that have been done in the past and recognized the benefits of working together to feed the hungry, clothe and house the poor, and love our neighbor.

We discussed using the name "Outreach and Social Justice," or simply "Social Outreach," and how this work is an organic part of being Christians in the world, not something optional or separate.

Father Paul expressed a desire to lean into the expanding work of the Breakfast Program in conjunction with the Delonis Center and the Shelter Association ("mission-creeping"). Merilynne Rush introduced LAITR (Life After Incarceration: Transition & Re-entry) and announced their upcoming Life Skills event on February 4 in the Parish Hall following Breakfast. Member Chris Dunkel Schetter is drafting a new mission statement and will begin offering small group discussions at church about Social Outreach. In addition, many other events and ideas were mentioned. Stay tuned for further developments!

On May 10 and 11 we will be staging *Fiddler on the Roof*, based on stories by Sholem Aleichem, with book by Joseph Stein and music by Jerry Bock. There are many parts to cast, and we are always looking to see the theater family grow! The First Reading will be on Saturday, March 1 at 10:00 am in the Rainbow Room. As is tradition, the First Reading will be a potluck brunch. I hope to see a lot of folks there.

The setting of Fiddler seemed especially apt this year, with the presence of certain people living in this country being questioned. Spoiler alert: a key element in the *Fiddler* story line is that the Jews are being forcibly removed from a place in Russia where they have lived for a long time. I found a personal connection a few years ago, visiting Ellis Island. My forebears were German-speaking Mennonites who lived in various places around Europe, partly based on changing political climates. They were living in Russia, in what is now the Ukraine, in the 1870's, when it was decreed that their pacifism would no longer be acceptable, and many came to this country at that time. It dawned on me looking at displays at Ellis Island that this was about the same time as the pogroms that the *Fiddler* characters were caught up in.

The church office and all of the schools are closed, but the Breakfast Program hosted a large crowd this morning, and we will be here again tomorrow. I am so grateful for our many dedicated volunteers who brave the cold temperatures in the morning to greet our guests with a smile, a cup of hot coffee and a mug of homemade soup.

As I watch the snow fall outside my office window, I am thinking about the many blessings and moments of grace that we experienced here in the Parish Hall at St. Andrew's throughout the holiday season. And I find myself marveling at the kindness and generosity that so many in our community showered on our breakfast guests again this year. In November, the Ann Arbor Thrift Shop visited the Breakfast and handed out gloves and hats. Later that month, students from Ann Arbor Open School delivered to-go meals for our guests. Medical students with Wolverine Street Medicine provided footcare and distributed new socks and shoes. A group from the University of Michigan spent an afternoon in our kitchen baking Christmas cookies for our guests. We are truly blessed to have the support of so many as we continue this important work.

Our generous donors helped us provide a wonderful feast for our guests on Thanksgiving. The menu included sweet and sour meatballs, ham, macaroni and cheese, sweet potatoes, mashed potatoes, green beans, cranberry sauce and cake. On Christmas morning, we hosted a party for about 140 guests. Fifteen volunteers came in to prepare and serve the meal and distribute Christmas gifts. We are grateful to the Anesthesiology Department at Mott Hospital for providing thermal coffee mugs and toiletries. And our guests appreciated the hats, gloves and socks provided by all of you, our St. Andrew's family. Many of our guests feel invisible and unloved as they move through the world, and your generosity gave them a moment to feel valued and cared for on a very special holiday morning.

We had a special visit this month from Ketch Secor, the founder and frontman of Old Crow Medicine Show. Those of you who attended the benefit concert in September will remember that he spoke of the Breakfast Program throughout the entire performance. He was back in Ann Arbor this weekend and wanted to see for himself what goes on in our Parish Hall every morning. Ketch toured our facility, visited with guests and helped clean tables after breakfast. He said that on his next visit, he would like to bring his instruments and play in the dining room!
