#### Update from the Vestry and **Finance Committee**

As of April 30th, our total income is \$40,296 more than budgeted on the year and our total expenses are \$15,899 under budget. While this is good news, it is important to remember that we balanced the 2024 Operating Budget with \$62,502 from Prior Years' Surplus, representing about 30% of our cash reserves. If the current financial pictures holds, we might not need to draw from reserves, meaning we would retain a bit more of a financial cushion for future years.

Thanks to the faithful generosity of our members, our pledge payments are at 98.5% of budget for the year. As we rely on the pledges of our members for 80% of our operating budget, timely pledge payments are important for our cash flow. Thank you for your generous support of our mission and ministry!

### **Spring Fund Drive for Food Gatherers**

Thank you to everyone who contributed to Food Gatherers! Including the match, you raised \$15,149 which will provide 30,298 meals. This is a testament to the generosity of our congregation, and to the care we have for feeding people in our community.






## **Church School Happenings**

We recently asked our breakfast guests to share feedback about the Breakfast Program, and those are just a few of the comments we received. We have been working hard to provide a safe and comfortable space for our guests to eat their morning meal, and we are proud of the community that continues to grow in our dining room. We have learned the names of many of our guests, and we now wear name tags so they can learn ours. We have added more people to each shift so that volunteers are available to circulate in the dining room. They offer water or coffee refills and engage in conversation with those who need a sympathetic ear or simply want to chat.

We shared a joyful morning together on Easter. Thank you to Dennis Powers for donating several spiral sliced hams for the feast. We rounded out the menu with sweet and sour meatballs, candied sweet potatoes, mashed potatoes, green beans, fresh red and green peppers, and cake. Fifteen volunteers came together that morning to prepare and serve the holiday meal. Thank you to our Easter team for making the holiday special for our guests.

We recently partnered with <u>Wolverine Street Medicine</u>, a group of U of M medical students who provide care to people experiencing homelessness. They will be hosting a monthly foot care clinic at the Breakfast. Services will include nail trimming, callus removal and wound care. Many of our guests walk miles every day, and it is important for them to keep their feet healthy. Thank you to Wolverine Street Medicine for reaching out and offering these important services. If there is sufficient demand, they could expand their services to provide blood pressure and blood sugar screenings as well.

Back in the kitchen, we have continued our cooking and food prep sessions to turn nutritious ingredients from Food Gatherers into delicious meals we can heat and serve in the morning. We are particularly proud of our crème brûlée French toast, vegetable strata, penne with beef and marinara, chili, vegetable bean soup, and ever popular macaroni and cheese. We are so grateful for our partnership with Food Gatherers. Their support has allowed us to take full advantage of our new health license and create these dishes.

We are also grateful for the extra time together in the kitchen. While many of our regular volunteers have worked with the same team for years, many have never met the volunteers who work on different days. The cooking sessions bring different volunteers together, and it has been a lot of fun watching new friendships develop as we chop vegetables and create new recipes together.
